The present study examines the major challenges associated with social security systems, with a specific focus on the accessibility, adequacy, and sustainability of social security benefits. The research addresses the problem of uneven coverage, limited awareness, and implementation gaps that reduce the effectiveness of social security mechanisms among different categories of beneficiaries. The objectives of the study include identifying key challenges in social security administration, analyzing beneficiaries' perceptions, and assessing the relationship between institutional support and perceived social security outcomes. A descriptive and analytical research design is adopted, using both primary and secondary data collected from employees across selected regions of Andhra Pradesh. Statistical tools such as percentage analysis, mean score analysis, correlation, regression, and Structural Equation Modeling (SEM) are employed to analyze the data. The findings reveal that lack of awareness, administrative complexity, informal employment, and inadequate enforcement significantly affect the effectiveness of social security systems. The study highlights important policy implications by emphasizing the need for simplified procedures, increased awareness initiatives, and stronger institutional coordination to improve social security delivery and outcomes.
